

COMPANY PROFILE

FREDERICKS CORPORATION PTY LTD T/A DARE ADVENTURES is a privately owned and operated company based in DWELLINGUP Western Australia. The Company Director, Clayton Fredericks, has both a sporting and business background. He has been involved with baseball for over twenty years, playing and coaching professionally overseas, playing and coaching at state level and playing for Western Australia's Perth Heat. Clayton has worked as Junior Development Officer for both Melville and Mandurah Regions.

The camp is managed by Karen Thompson who is committed to making every camp a place where students can develop confidence and self esteem. The camp challenges the students to have the courage to test their limits while at the same time having a fun positive experience they will remember for a lifetime, *Challenge By Choice!*

DARE ADVENTURES, at Lot 1379 Vandals Road Dwellingup, is a purpose built outdoor adventure camp. It consists of two separate bunkhouses each capable of sleeping 36 people. Each comes complete with two showers, two toilets, a kitchen and an open area with a potbelly wood fire. A fully self contained chalet capable of sleeping 15 people is also available for use. To allow more people to enjoy the camp facilities an ablution block and 12 bed bunkroom are also available and we can cater for a further 30 campers in tents. A large dining / recreation room is available for large group camps.

The outdoor adventure activities available include the following;

- Dam for canoeing and swimming, (Seasonal, depends on water levels),
- A large oval for team sports with movable posts for football or volleyball,
- A Confidence Course with scramble net and large wall to negotiate,
- Large twin seated Flying Fox and an Abseiling and Climbing tower,
- Archery, two large trampolines and a quarter basketball court are also available.

To complement the programmes conducted, canoes, rafts, mountain bikes and a 5 lane archery range are available.

DARE ADVENTURES conducts a **"One Stop Shop"** facility to client group camps; we arrange all aspects of the camp for you. Transport to and from the camp, all catering, accommodation, outdoor staff and equipment use.

CAMP DIRECTIVE

1. GENERAL

Dare Adventures conduct an outdoor adventure learning camp for schools. This camp is generally conducted over 3 to 5 days and is held at Dwellingup Bunkhouses, Lot 1379 Vandals Road Dwellingup. The students are supervised and instructed by qualified and experienced staff in the area of adventure learning.

2. COSTS 2011 (All prices inclusive of GST)

On 30 paying students 2 adults may attend at no cost, 45 students = 3 adults, 60 students = 4 adults etc, Extra adults pay student prices. Students returning home early from camp **except for extreme medical conditions** will not be refunded full or part of the camp fees. Students leaving early return home at the parent's expense.

Transport can be arranged to & from the camp if needed. Prices start from \$35.00 per person.

If you do not wish your school to share the camp with another school, this can be arranged, minimum costs apply. Please call 9538 1314 to enquire about this option.

3. DEPOSIT/ CONFIRMED BOOKING

To secure your booking a non-refundable deposit of **\$350.00** is to be forwarded when you confirm your camp dates. If the camp is cancelled within 120 days of occurrence you will then be expected to pay 50% of the camp fee based on estimated numbers. This fee will be waived if another group takes your place.

4. PAYMENT

Full payment for the camp is to be paid by EFT / Cheque one (1) week prior to arrival at the camp. As we use these numbers for catering and staffing there will be no refund for students who do not attend.

5. ESTIMATED NUMBERS

It is vital to your entire camp that **if your estimated numbers change by 10 or more that you notify our office IMMEDIATLEY.** This change could affect your cost, accommodation style, meals, activities and other groups on the property.

6. TRANSPORT

We will provide all transport whilst on the camp for activities that form part of the camp program. Transport to and from the camp can be arranged if needed, costs will vary depending on the location of the school and number of passengers.

7. MEDICAL

For any prescribed medical problems staff should be advised of the following: Type of disorder, likelihood of attack, location of medicine, dosage and how to administer, and any other treatment/notification. Peel Health Campus is 45 minutes away. **Schools are required to bring their own 1st aid medical kit** capable of administering to minor cuts and abrasions **and a safety vehicle**. A camp first aid kit is available. Individuals should have ambulance cover as a Priority 1 or 2 callout is upwards of \$975.00 payable by the parents.

8. PRE-CAMP REQUIREMENTS (a Final Details Form will be emailed to you)

AT LEAST 2 WEEKS PRIOR to camp please inform us of the following;

- a. Any special diets i.e. allergies, vegetarian or religious constraints;
- b. Birthdays.
- c. **Camp numbers with a breakdown of boys, girls and adults.** These numbers will be used to issue your final invoice. As we use these numbers for catering and staffing there will be no refund for students who do not attend.

9. FOOD

Students should bring their own lunch on the first day. All further meals will be provided throughout the camp. Students are encouraged to bring a packet of biscuits/cake for suppers or morning and afternoon teas. Morning and/or afternoon tea can be provided at an additional cost and must be requested at the time of booking.

10. MONEY

Experience has shown that students don't require money. There are no shops or arranged shopping visits.

11. INSURANCE

Dare Adventures have 10 million dollar public liability insurance for all students involved with a staffed camp.

12. EQUIPMENT LIST

Dare Adventures provide all accommodation, food and equipment. There are mountain bikes, a flying fox, canoes, archery sets, quarter basketball court, 2 large in ground trampolines, football/volley ball posts etc. You will need to bring your own music system, tapes or CD's. There is no TV or DVD/Video.

13. STUDENT CLOTHING

The students will need to bring along the following items listed;

14. CAMP DUTIES

A cook comes in for all meals except breakfast. Camp staff would appreciate the students, parent helpers and teachers helping with the overall housekeeping duties of the Bunkhouses. You will be expected to clean up, sweep out and return the bunkhouses in a neat and tidy condition on your departure.

15. DAMAGES

We will accept damages attributed to fair wear and tear but any damage accidental or otherwise to windows, fixtures or deliberate vandalism will be paid for by the group.

16. AIM

The aim of the camp is to give students the opportunity to experience outdoor education activities in a natural environment. To promote an appreciation of the environment, to foster teamwork and to improve communication skills while meeting new and varied challenges.

17. ACTIVITIES

The students may be involved in the following activities: canoeing, water activities, confidence course, flying fox, abseiling, climbing wall, archery, mountain biking, orienteering, bush walking, crate climb and team games. Water activities will be held on our property if dam water levels permit or on the Murray River.

18. PROGRAMME

The suggested programme is attached please feel free to delete or add as you may wish. The camp director reserves the right to alter or change the programme if required whilst the students are on camp.

19. COMMUNICATIONS

A phone is available for emergency use only at the Camp Office. There is a public pay phone in Dwellingup Township 1.5.kms away.

20. SUPERVISION

Camp staff will take responsibility for the technical and related safety of the students whilst doing organised activities only. Teachers will need to supervise students during after hour periods i.e. 1600hrs - 0900hrs and lunchtime 1200 - 1300hrs. Teachers need to supervise, trampolines, swimming and general play during these periods.

21. VISITORS

To ensure the safety and privacy of all students on camp parents and other visitors may only come by prior arrangement

22. POLICE CLEARANCES

All staff have WA Working with Children Cards.

23. ACCEPTANCE OF CAMP DIRECTIVE

The payment of the deposit is confirmation that you accept the terms and conditions of this camp directive.

Adult Helper Roster

Breakfast

0715 Supervise group and assist with the preparation of Breakfast and setup of the tables etc. Fill dishwashing sinks. After the meal supervise the washing and drying of dishes by the students. Supervise the cleaning of tables and sweeping of the dining hall

Lunch

Assist with bringing out, serving and returning food to the kitchen.

Dinner

Adults supervise the group on Dining Setup 5.30 pm, fill the sinks just prior to the evening meal and help serve dinner. After the evening meal supervise washing and drying of dishes by students.

Morning and afternoon teas

Supper, biscuits, etc bought by the students are to be put into enclosed containers. At the appropriate times adults are to serve these out. You will be shown how to make Milo for supper (winter only).

Cooks Dishes

Generally maintain the kitchen in a tidy condition. The Cooks' dishes are to be washed by **ADULTS**. Experience has shown us that the students are not capable of washing big pots, etc. However students can dry the dishes and place away.

General Tidy

Maintain the cleanliness of the bunkhouses and grounds.

Toilets

Maintain the hygiene of the students and the facilities. Students are NOT expected to clean toilets but floors and basins are to be kept cleaned and free from rubbish.

End of Camp

At completion of the camp assist with the overall sweeping and general cleanup of the dormitories, bathrooms and downstairs areas.

Adults are encouraged to join in the activities with the children. However the more people we have help with the 'housekeeping' side of the camp the quicker we can get to the fun part of camp – the activities.

Responsibilities of Teachers/Leaders **Whilst On Camp**

2.1 SUPERVISION

Campsite staff will take responsibility for the technical and related safety of the students whilst completing organised activities only. Teachers or adults attached to the activity groups are to assist with the supervision and discipline of the students during these organised activities.

Teachers will need to supervise students during after hours i.e. 1600hrs - 0800hrs and lunchtime 1200 - 1300hrs. Teachers need to supervise trampolines, confidence course, swimming and general play during these periods.

2.2 SICK BAY

An impromptu sickbay is easily arranged if required for children feeling unwell. Normally a sick child is placed in a downstairs bunk nearest the kitchen area.

2.3 FIRST AID

You should have bought with you a first aid kit for minor scrapes and sprains. An ice pack is in the freezer. All camp staff are St John Senior First aid trained. You are required to transport walking injured to the doctor using your own safety vehicle. The teacher / leader of the campers are ultimately responsible for all first aid decisions.

For any camper injured or becomes ill on camp and requires doctor's attention you are to complete the register with the campers details etc. This is held in the pantry.

Please note the following points as they are often overlooked;

- Please bring a school first aid kit with enough band-aids for all those boo boo's 😊
- Please ensure the students have lunch with them for day 1.
- Please ensure you have a safety vehicle with a road map for doctor's trips.



Emergency Management Plan Outline

General

Students on an outdoor adventure camp will have the potential to be hurt either in a minor way i.e. scrapes and scratches to more major injuries of deep cuts, broken bones or drowning.

To ensure students are operating in a safe environment all necessary safety precautions whilst conducting formal training are to be adhered to.

During "free time" our history has shown that this is when the majority of scrapes and scratches occur. Normally from bike riding mishaps or cut feet from the water activity area.

Ensure for all bike riders that a Helmet and footwear are always worn and for the water activities that some form of footwear is worn i.e. reef type sandals. Apply normal TLC and patch up the patients and for the more serious patients or situations do the following;

Action on Serious Casualties

1. Apply emergency first aid and stabilize patient to best of ability before moving; or
2. Call for an ambulance;
3. The nearest doctor is in Pinjarra and the nearest hospital is Peel Health, Lakes Rd, Mandurah;
4. When a students is taken off camp for treatment, report details to the office as soon as possible.

Action on Vehicle Accidents

1. Treat any injured personal and arrange for assistance if required;
2. Don't admit liability for the accident;
3. Get other vehicle details if possible;
4. Don't sign any forms with Tow truck Operators at all;
5. Remember your priority is 1st aid first and then concern yourself with accident details; and
6. Don't rush into anything and keep me informed until I arrive.

Action on Bushfire (Siren Sounded 3 times)

1. If at night wake children and evacuate to basket ball court area;
2. Do a head count;
3. If a small localized fire put it out using extinguishers and hoses; or
4. Load vans and take students to town Oval if required; and
5. If by day do as above.

Action on Power Failure

General – The power in the Dwellingup area does fail from time to time but the service is normally restored quickly. The other power failures may occur from a cut off switch activating if a power point is over loaded. Water will not be pumped to toilets, showers or taps if the power is off. This is only a problem for extended power breaks. Check the Power pole nearest the Blue bunkhouse to restore the safety cut out switch or each building power box if the power cut is localized to that particular building.

Emergency Signal - If you hear a siren giving 3 blasts you are to stop immediately whatever you are doing and gather on the basket ball court and await further instructions.

Action on Any Other Emergency

For any other emergency refer to the Campsite Emergency Handbook located in the leader's room of each bunkhouse.

Description of Activities

Flying Fox:

Students have a number of goes on a tandem flying fox. The distance of the flying fox is approximately 50m. Students will also learn basic skills and tricks on the trampoline and be involved in a team building game.

Abseil: (a surcharge of \$10 per person applies to this activity)

The students will learn and experience abseiling on a 10m artificial abseiling wall. Then will experience overhang abseiling.

Archery:

Students will be taught basic skills of archery, and then will put the skills into practise in smaller groups, shooting at targets which are placed at a range of distances. Students also compete in friendly competition and a team building game.

Canoe: (a surcharge of \$10 per person applies to this activity)

Students will be driven down to the Murray river, where they will be taught basic skills of canoeing, then participate in a number of games and a paddle up and down river.

Confidence Course:

Students will test their fitness, balance, co-ordination and confidence on our 9 obstacle course. They will also get muddy and dirty going through the mud pits and dam.

Mountain Bike Riding:

Students will go on an 8km bike ride through state forest around Dwellingup, visiting places that were once destroyed by 1961 fires. Stopping in town at the visitor's centre, where they will learn more about the local timber mill industry and the effects of the bush fires, before heading back to camp.

Orienteering:

The students learn about pacing and compasses then put the skills into practise to find codes and objects in and around surrounding bush of the camp property.

Team Building Games:

Students participate in 5 different team building games, focussing the group to work as a team by building communication and co-operation skills.

Raft Building: (only available if Dam levels are high enough)

The group works as a team to build a raft that can fit their team on and paddle around the dam. The groups will learn about how to tie knots and what kind of designs will work.

Bush walk:

Students will go on a walk through the state forest around camp approximately 2km completing a checklist, learning about the flora and fauna in the forest. The students will also build cubbies and participate in a game while in the forest.

Crate Climb:

Designed for groups too young to abseil. Students have to work together to build towers out of crates, so that the students can climb the crates to reach the top of the abseil wall, or as high as they would like.

Rock Climbing:

Students are challenged to climb our 10 m high rock wall, with the option of going as high as they would like.

Paintball: (not suitable for Primary School, Price not included in basic camp cost - POA)

Paintball is an ideal team sport. Teams get to battle it out on the fields, trying to outwit their opponents and secure victory! In general Paintball is a sport that you win by making and taking advantage of opportunities. The way you make opportunities is to move. You move behind an obstacle. You move to a better spot. You move to grab a flag. You move to cover a teammate. Movement comparatively, is more important than shooting.

Dolphin Cruise (Price not included in basic camp cost - POA)

Students are taken by Bus to Mandurah where they can enjoy a 1 hour Cruise to see the Dolphins. Cruise times vary and a fish & chip lunch is offered on board or a packed lunch can be taken from camp and eaten on the foreshore.

They are then returned to camp for normal program.

Other external activities can also be arranged if requested.
